At the beginning of the term, when everything is fresh and new, it is so easy to give your best. There are new spiral notebooks, sharp pencils, and clean erasers. Things are organized well in your desk and file cabinet. Nothing has become stacked on the back shelf. The fresh set of resolutions you had established this summer are clearly implanted in your heart, and you know this year is going to be so different.

But now it is week eight in the semester, and the principal has called an extra faculty meeting. And, it is on a Wednesday night of all nights, when you already had something planned! Plus, you have four students who have just stayed after class, asking for extra help in the ten minutes you have to get your lessons on the board for tomorrow before you have to leave for the faculty meeting. You will cram the essays, the tests, and your lesson plans for tomorrow into your book bag and try to finish up after prayer meeting tonight when you finally get home.

Suddenly, as you are reading through the passage of scripture for tonight's study, Malachi 1:8-14, you begin to recognize yourself. How did the perfect teacher at the beginning of the year get to the place where she is about to begin to offer "blemished sacrifices" to the Lord? If we are satisfied with anything less than our very best, that is the condition where we have arrived. It is like the Israelites who were offering crippled or diseased animals. Malachi proclaimed, "'Try offering them to your governor? Would he be pleased with you? Would he accept you?' says the Lord Almighty."

We cannot bring unworthy sacrifices to the one who has given all for us. God demands and deserves better. Chapter 2 of Malachi lets us know what will happen when we do not bring the proper sacrifices. Malachi 3:2 states: "He (God) will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver. He will purify the Levites and refine them like gold and silver. Then the Lord will have men who will bring offerings in righteousness."

Now I don't know if you understand how they purify gold and silver, but it is done by putting the substance through the fire to burn off the impurities. If we have blemished or crippled sacrifices in the offerings of our lives, God will have to put us through the fires of testing and troubles. He will use this process so He can bring us out purer and more acceptable in His sight. Now I don't know about you, but I do not enjoy the fires of testing. They are never pleasant—very necessary maybe—but never, never enjoyable.

God does not want us to do just an OK job as a teacher, not even an acceptable job. God doesn't want a "good enough to get by" job. We must give nothing but our best-a worthy and acceptable sacrifice to a worthy Lord and King. What do you want all to see in your life at that great white throne judgment-vessels unto honor or vessels unto dishonor?

The good news is that God offers more than judgment for our offerings. When we are faithful in bringing the sacrifice of our lives, He promises blessings. For He declares in Malachi 3:10 (NIV), "Test me in this . . . and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it." When God called us to teach, He did not ask us to do it alone. Isaiah 30:18 comforts us in saying: "Yet the Lord longs to be gracious to you; he rises to show you compassion. For the Lord is a God of justice. Blessed are all who wait for him!"

When I feel that situations in my classroom or my life are out of control, I probably am not waiting on the Lord to direct me. I need Him to show me which task to attack first or even which one was not meant for me to be doing at all. Many times we allow others to feel tasks are meant for us when God never meant for us to pick them up at all. I am quickly learning to ask Him first before I agree to crowd my schedule. I need to wait for Him to approve, because He truly is a God of justice. He will definitely say to me, "This is the way, walk in it."

When God gives me a job, I will do it with all my might as unto the Lord. For God has called us to be living sacrifices, holy and acceptable. This gift is what is reasonable. It is not too much to ask because God's only Son gave everything for us.
